Imagine the security you could offer to one of these children and their mother by opening up your home to them, even for a short period. 

Small act, great symbolism

Upon purchasing one of Mrs Hayter's knitted coasters for her efforts in raising funds for Ukraine, the flower knitted in the middle of it reminded me of the William Blake poetry the Year 13 English Literature students are currently studying. Many of Blake's poems contain images of nature and were published around the time of the French Revolution which reminded me of two certain individuals within it.

First was poet and political activist Olympe de Gouges who, upon seeing that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights only applied to free men, proceeded to write her own, a Universal Declaration of Women's Rights.

Secondly, Toussaint Louverture asked whether the Universal Declaration of Human Rights applied to slaves too. Louverture then triggers the Haitian Revolution, liberates all slaves, and establishes a free democratic republic on the principles of the French Revolution.

What this reminded me of was that anyone's individual acts can contribute to a wider awareness. So thank you, Mrs Hayter, for going to the trouble of knitting these coasters; your single act is working towards a conscious collective.
