

A Level Geography Field Trip



The year 12 geography students partook in coastal investigation fieldwork on the Dorset coast in Weymouth. They were accompanied by Mrs Rogers, Mr Finnie and Mr McCarthy. Throughout their 4 days of investigations students learned to use various fieldwork techniques including beach profiling, wave investigations, environmental quality assessments, observations of coastal settlements and for a bit of fun, had a go on a giant swing. The students were also able to investigate the effectiveness of coastal engineering strategies and see the plans for future strategies to protect the coastline.

The areas that students investigated included Durdle Door, Lulworth Cove and town Weymouth itself just to name a few places. students spent time reviewing the data collection where they learned presentation new techniques such as spearman's rank and plotting radar graphs. The students learned lot and really appreciated that they got to see these places and processes in person rather than from a PowerPoint.
