Year 9 visit to Balliol College, Oxford

On Thursday 10th November Balliol College Oxford hosted Y9 students for a second time.

Jack, the college outreach officer, met us outside the Ashmolean Museum in the centre of the city and took us through the winding streets of Oxford to Balliol College.

Students were given a tour of the college by 1st year undergraduates with many of our students "grilling" them with questions focusing on student life at Oxford.

It was then time to move onto one of the college buildings where Jack spoke about what to expect when applying to university and the support that Balliol College offers its students.

Lunch was served in the College Hall - the venue has the look and feel of a Harry Potter set! We then took a stroll around the local area taking in the world famous Bodleian Library and the oldest buildings that make up the university. We also stopped by a church that was an inspiration for C.S Lewis while writing The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe.

Back at Balliol College, students were divided into groups and given a discussion exercise. This proved to be one of the high points of the day with many contrasting opinions being voiced and debated. The objective of the exercise is to help students develop understanding of a particular area and to become comfortable speaking about it with their peer group.

This was the final part of our day and we returned to school with great memories and new aspirations.



Soaring to Success

In late November, students from Years 11, 12 and 13 started their journey on the Soaring to Success programme.

Soaring to Success is a careers enrichment programme that bridges the gap between education and industry. It aims to inspire, enable, and support the next generation to consider a career within aviation and aerospace.

Our students took part in a virtual careers conference that was split into 2 hour sessions over 4 days. Students were able to engage with speakers from British Airways, Airbus, Boeing, BAE Systems and several other leading UK and worldwide organisations, who gave an insight into the distinct career opportunities across the broad scope of the aviation and aerospace industries. It is not just pilot training or cabin crew!

Students will continue on the programme with online modules and, once these have been completed, they will have the opportunity to visit Elstree Airport in the summer term for a full day of aviation experiences including piloting a glider!





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Reading for Year 7, 8 and 9

All students should be reading for at least 20 minutes every day. This will improve their literacy skills which will help them in every single subject at school.

To support this, all students in Years 7, 8 and 9 are taking part in the Accelerated Reader programme. This is an online reading programme which measures students' progress in reading.

When your child finishes a book, they should complete the quiz on Accelerated Reader to check their understanding of the text. The programme will then suggest books at the right level for your child to improve their reading skills. Many of these books are available in our school library.

All students have had one reading lesson per week since September to support the improvement in their reading skills. All students are familiar with using this software.



These changes have come about through our work this term on bullying and giving students further methods to report any concerns they have through <u>icanreport@thegrange.futureacademies.org</u>.


We have also continued to focus on the use of STEPS - to develop student manners and respect and SLANT - to ensure that students are fully focused in lessons.

In the corridors we have introduced a system of walking on the left and a mantra that students should be purposeful, calm and punctual when moving through the school building. Alongside this we have increased the sanction for being late to lessons - this means that if students are more than 5 minutes late to a lesson without a valid reason then they receive an afterschool Academy detention. This has made a huge difference and we will be continuing with this in January.

- The academy website <u>www.thegrange.futureacademies.org</u>


Further updates and relevant contingency plans will also be communicated via above as appropriate.


If public exams are due to be held on the day of closure we will do everything we can to ensure the exams are not disrupted.
