### **Sport Awards Evening – July 2023**






On Wednesday 19 July we will be hosting a ticket only Sport Awards Evening at the Grange Academy.

Well done to all the students for taking part in the scholars programme this year, you deserve a big shout out for all your hard work and commitment.



On the 26<sup>th</sup> of April, top set students in year 7 and 8 sat the Junior Maths Challenge run by the UK Mathematics Trust.



### Chinglish An Almost Entirely True Story by Sue Cheung

Jo Kwan is a teenager growing up in 1980s Coventry with her annoying little sister, too-cool older brother, a series of very unlucky pets and utterly bonkers parents. But unlike the other kids at her new school or her posh cousins, Jo lives above her parents' Chinese takeaway. And things can be tough — whether it's unruly customers or the snotty popular girls who bully Jo for being different. Even when she does find a BFF who actually likes Jo for herself, she still has to contend with her erratic dad's behaviour. All Jo dreams of is breaking free and forging a career as an artist.

Told in diary entries and doodles, Jo's brilliantly funny observations about life, family and char siu make for a searingly honest portrayal of life on the other side of the takeaway counter.

### **Mobile Phones**

Remember the rules with regard to mobile phones at The Grange. Once a student enters the school building in the morning their phone must be switched off and placed in their bag or blazer for the remainder of the day until they leave the building to travel home.

If a student takes their phone out at any stage the following rules will be implemented:


- The first time the students phone is confiscated, it will be until the end of the same day
- The second time the student's phone is confiscated, it will be for one school week
- If students refuse to hand over their phone they will be placed in Internal Exclusion until the phone is given to the member of staff.

### **Travel Expectations**

Uniform - students should travel to and from school in full school uniform.

Behaviour - if students display poor behaviour on their journey, the same sanctions will be given to students as if they were at school.

If students repeatedly misbehave on public transport then their right to use this will be withdrawn and they will be asked to find a different mode of transport.

### **Examinations Feedback**

Our Year 11 and Year 13 students are half way through their public exams - we are receiving really positive feedback from the students that their hard work and commitment is paying off during the actual assessments. They now have a week to recharge their batteries, take short breaks with friends and family and maintain the revision timetable which is in place each day to prepare them for the final set of exams in June.

Throughout the exams we are really proud that Year 11 students are still coming to school everyday. Our attendance for this year group in May is at 97% - this shows truly amazing dedication. Year 13 students are also choosing to come to school for final intervention and revision sessions rather than rely on independent study - this strategy is proven nationally to get the best results.
