Dear Parents and Carers

I am writing to you at the end of an incredibly busy, but enormously successful half term. Over the last 6 weeks the academy has continued to take actions to improve the school experience for everyone involved with The Grange Academy, and most importantly look to ensure the academic progress of our students. I have communicated to you as our parents, the academy's dedication to it's vision statement of *Libertas per Cultum* (Freedom through Education), and how we are unwavering in our belief that this will only be achieved through working with you to ensure our expectations of our students are as high as they possibly can be. To expect less would be to do the students at The Grange Academy a disservice.

My commitment to the above has led me to request greater staffing capacity for a period of time upon return from the half-term break (Monday 26th February). As a result, the Future Academies Trust, of which we are proudly part of, will be deploying a number of additional school leaders to be based at The Grange Academy from the 26th February. They will be introduced to the students upon our return from half-term.

Return Arrangements

Alongside the additional staff capacity the school will be receiving, we will also be making some changes to the school day for the first two weeks back of the half-term break (from the 26th February). The additional time will be used for further training with our staff to support our school improvement priorities. The details of changes to school day timings are outlined in the table below:

Parent Working Group

We hope you found the session useful, the focus was on communication and reports, with an opportunity for parents to provide feedback and ask questions about how our parent reports will look this academic year (this will be sent to you this week, with an accompanying letter from Laura Abbott, Academic Vice Principal).

Alongside this, please see below the other areas covered within the Spring 1 PWG meeting:

- Homework Update regarding changes. A KS3 Homework Timetable has now been distributed to all students in Yr7, Yr8 and Yr9.
- Revision materials and exam preparation for students The academy has looked to consolidate this in some
 year groups, to both support ease of access for students and to allow parents to take greater accountability
 in ensuring their child is revising for upcoming assessments (Yr11 mocks will be taking place immediately
 after the half term).
- MyChildAtSchool (MCAS) Jon Nagle (Pastoral Vice Principal) went through the MCAS App that is available
 to all parents, including key functionality around tracking your childs attendance, details of positive and
 negative behaviour points and alerts/notifications of any detentions. Please do contact your childs Head of
 Year or the pastoral team if you have not yet accessed this. It is important that all of our parents are using
 MCAS and that we can continue to develop how it is utilised to support parental communication/
 engagement.

Our next meeting will be a morning session (9am – 10am) and is provisionally scheduled for the 20th March 2024. I will write to all parents to confirm details closer to the time. This session will be focused on *Sanctions* and *Rewards* in place at The Grange Academy.

Expectations: How can you support as a parent?

Attendance

Students who attend well and arrive on time achieve better than their peers at every external assessment point, including GSCEs and A levels. The research into the link between attendance and student attainment states that the link between overall absence and attainment when taking prior attainment and pupil characteristics into account showed that, for each KS2 and KS4 measure, overall absence had a statistically significant negative link to attainment – i.e:

- 1. Every extra day missed was associated with a lower attainment outcome.
- 2. A student with 100% attendance has an 80% chance of achieving at least 5 good GCSEs.
- 3. However, if a student takes one day off every 2 weeks (90% attendance) then this falls dramatically to 50%.

The table below shows the number of days, lessons, and minutes of learning missed for different attendance percentages.

It is important to recognise the importance of punctuality; being both on time to school (all students should be onsite by 8.30am, with any student arriving after 8.35am marked as late, and a 40-minute Academy Detention) and on time to lessons throughout each school day. The school has introduced a '2 buzzer system' this term, whereby a buzzer will sound to indicate the end of a lesson, followed by a second buzzer 5 minutes later to indicate that you should already be inside the classroom of your next lesson. This has been introduced to provide clarity to the students around being late to lessons and students are expected to be in lessons ready to learn before the 2nd buzzer sounds. Failure to be inside the classroom at this point will result in a 40-minute Academy Detention being issued.

Equipment

As well as good attendance, it is important that students are prepared for their learning. This includes being fully equipped for lessons. Students should have a;

- Black or blue pen (x2)
- Green pen
- Pencil
- Ruler
- Calculator
- A clear pencil case
- Reading book

We will be adding further checks at the start of each school day to ensure that students have come equipped and prepared to learn. Should a student speak to pastoral staff before the start of the school day about why they might not have their pencil case that day, we will look to provide a solution and no additional sanction will be issued. However, where students have not arrived equipped to learn (with the items above) and have not brought this to the attention of the pastoral team before any checks are complete, a 40-minute Academy Detention will be issued.

Uniform

Our Academy uniform policy and 6th form dress code are important to us. It promotes a strong and cohesive identity within the Academy community. Our uniform policy reflects our values and reinforces our culture of high expectations and provides an opportunity to demonstrate our core value of **Respect.** To ensure your child has the correct uniform for the first day back please review the table below.
